KNOW THAT YOUR VOICE MATTERS

One of the first steps to advocacy is embracing the idea that you have the power to change the world around you. Your voice is important. It matters. Get out there and use it!

FIGURE OUT WHAT YOU ARE PASSIONATE ABOUT AND WHY

Ask yourself, “why do I love the arts and why do I want them to stay in my school?” How do you feel when you practice your favorite piano sequence? What makes your weekly art classes fun? What’s your favorite song to sing in choir? How does dancing make you feel? What do you learn about yourself and others through your theatre practice? Think about why you love the arts and write it down. It is important to be clear about your passions so that you can communicate your feelings and ideas effectively.

BE INFORMED AND KNOW YOUR FACTS

- The arts are proven to support students in school, but they also foster skills that make you successful in your career. Consider this: “A key and often overlooked benefit of exposure to the arts is that it fosters out-of-the-box thinking skills. These skills, such as creativity, innovation, critical thinking, problem-solving, communication, and collaboration, are precisely what we need to build a stronger workforce, a report from the Partnership for 21st Century Learning found.” (Source: Matthews, C. “The best, most creative leaders in any field have a background in the arts.” *The Dallas Morning News*. TALK TO YOUR PARENTS ABOUT YOUR ARTISTIC AND CREATIVE INTERESTS

Sometimes we assume that our parents know everything about us, but some of our interests may fly under their radar. Is there a particular instrument you’d like to try? Do you wish your school had an art or anime club? Let them know! Your parents can be great supporters in communicating your needs to those in charge of making decisions.

ENCOURAGE YOUR PARENTS TO JOIN YOUR PTA AND BOOSTER CLUBS

- Parents and teachers are important allies. Communication and collaboration are key to impacting change.
- PTA meetings are for parents and teachers to gather together and discuss important issues and events at school. Having your parent there could be a great way to get other parents and teachers more interested in your concerns.

- Booster clubs are dedicated to supporting arts programs in your school. Encourage your parents to be involved and to offer support when they are able.
- Ask your parents if you can give a speech or presentation at a PTA meeting. You will have some of your most important allies in one room. Use that to your advantage. Let them know what you think of the school's arts programs and facilities.

START A STUDENT-LED NEWSLETTER OR ASK THE SCHOOL NEWSPAPER TO INCLUDE AN ARTS AND CULTURE SECTION IN THEIR EDITORIALS

Chances are you're not the only student around who loves the arts. Get some friends together to start a newsletter for your school. Ask your teachers for permission to print a weekly/monthly/semesterly update on important art projects your peers are working on, upcoming school arts and music events, or spotlight new clubs on campus.

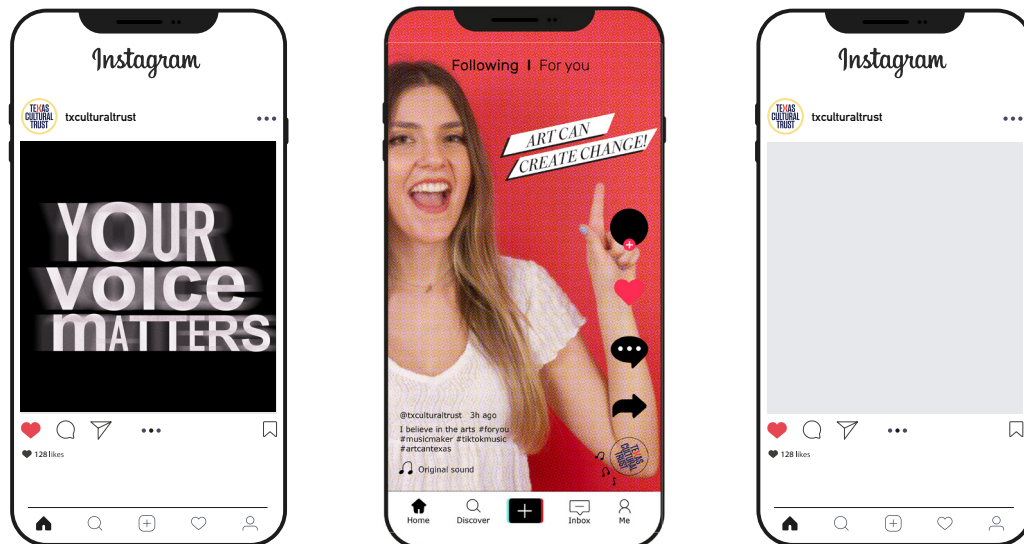
START A NEIGHBORHOOD-WIDE CHALK DAY

START A CAMPUS ARTS ADVOCACY GROUP

- Ask your arts teachers to sponsor the group, grab some friends, and pin down a location to host regular meetings. Get together and brainstorm ways to improve the arts in your school.
- We are better when we work together. Seek out existing arts advocacy groups and get involved in the collective work of advocating for the arts. By letting other groups know about your group and its mission, you can gain valuable support and allies for future advocacy.
- Volunteer. Your group should volunteer to perform or showcase your art at local nursing homes, district events, community centers, or churches. Spread your gift and show the world how much the arts can brighten their day.
